Greetings to you all,

Many people have been asking me two fundamental questions mainly:

I believe we must have a turnaround strategy and plan of action. We cannot be doing things in the same old way and expect different results.

As a Cathedral we need to have a mission and vision statement, which I am in the process of drawing up and also consulting the strategic team. I am excited about the prospect of growing the church and the build up towards Back to church Sunday (BTCS). As your vicar I am fully behind these initiatives that you are taking to grow the church.

We need to be an inviting and welcoming church and we must master our unique selling point(USP).

Answering the second question, I have no personal policy but I embrace the Canons and Constitution as well as the Diocesan rules and regulations and Pastoral guidelines of ACSA. I subscribe to an open door policy and am prepared to learn and serve the parish.

- I believe in team ministry and have a strong pastoral care.
- My vision is to build a strong united Christian community.
- My vision is to have a maintenance program for our buildings and cathedral grounds.
- To make the parish self-sustainable and to encourage people to have a clear understanding of the modern economy.
- To have a strong social and health issues desk, including advocacy.
- The training and equipping of the people of God

BACK TO CHURCH SUNDAY / INVITATION SUNDAY

You might very well ask, 'What is that?' And the answer is that it is the simplest and shortest step in evangelism, when we invite someone we already know to come to our church. Originally the focus was only on inviting back those who used to attend church. However, the initiative has come now to include inviting those who never went to Church, gently encouraging them and warmly welcoming them - hence the alternate heading above!

It is a very basic way of getting the congregation to reach out to others. It was first started in 2004 in England and has already proved successful. Anglican Churches from all traditions have embraced this resource. By having a Back to Church Sunday (BTCS) as a congregation we can brush up on how we welcome people who are new and inculcate evangelism through a simple invitation. Among other things we will have to think through how we encourage those who respond to the invitation to keep coming back, and help them to become connected to the church family. Church groups can so easily and unintentionally become 'closed' groups.

Our Parish Council has decided to have a Back to Church Sunday on the 15th of September. The organizing body, 'Grow the Church' (GtC), has already been contacted to assist us in launching the event and the Evangelism Portfolio of the Council is in the process of developing a BTCS Team to get the happening off the ground.

The success of this process should not be seen in terms of percentages or numbers but as one person inviting another person. Furthermore, it is not intended to be a one-day-wonder but the development of a warmer, welcoming atmosphere at churches that last all year, everyone acting together to bring others back to Church and to God.


As we approach the date there will be steps taken so that we are all informed and prepared. Even at this stage however you are encouraged to pray for this Evangelistic project and for the BTCS Team that will lead it. Begin to consider those who you might invite and pray that God will guide you in this matter.

Our prayer is that such an event will have a powerful influence on us as a congregation as we fulfill Jesus' Commission of bring others to Him as Saviour and Lord so that they can also experience His love and forgiveness.

so bring your purses to Church on that day and come and buy a beautiful present for someone special!"



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



A VERY GRACIOUS LADY WHO LIVES ON THE CATHEDRAL CLOSE

Living on the Cathedral grounds half her life is a Priest's widow who has recently celebrated her 98th birthday.

She is Gerda Hendrika Wilhelmina van der Sijde.

Her home country is the Netherlands and when she arrived in this country she could speak very little English.

The Revd Willem van der Sijde and Gerda were married by proxy and their wedding was blessed at the Cathedral on the 27th of January 1951, after she had travelled to South Africa on one of the ships of the Union Castle Line, the Bloemfontein Castle (nog al). Although Fr Willem was also Dutch he had studied at Kelhem in England and was offered a position here in the OFS by the then Archbishop of Cape Town.

The couple lived in White Cottage which in those days was not as fancy as it is today, and Fr Willem was on the staff of the Cathedral when the Very Revd Findley was the Dean. Fr Willem used a bicycle as his means of transport. After four years the couple were transferred to Dewetsdorp where



son Michael was born. There were many outstations and Fr. Willem was kept busy as was Gerda with her small baby.

In the late1950s Father Willem accepted a position at the Cathedral in Windhoek, South West Africa. Gerda tells me that she enjoyed the Continental life of that largely Germanspeaking city. They were happy living there for fifteen or so years. Young Michael had his schooling in Windhoek. Fr Willem had hoped to be made Dean of Windhoek Cathedral but the Bishop never offered him the position. Instead he was asked to do some research on the Church in SWA (now Namibia).

At that juncture, the Rt Revd Freddie Amoore, then the Bishop of Bloemfontein, invited Fr Willem to return to the Cathedral in the early 1970s and the family was housed in the Rijnki, which is now the Diocesan Centre. Fr Willem served on the Staff until 1976 when he unfortunately passed away. Gerda then moved into the Retired Clergy Cottage No.4 where she has lived ever since. Her son Michael lived with her for a short while before moving to his own residence. He worked for Telkom. Unhappily he died a young man of thirty-nine when Gerda was sixty-five.

The Very Revd Aidan Cross was then Dean of the Cathedral and as Gerda lived on the Cathedral Close, he asked her to be the Head Sacristan. Every day she would be at the Cathedral laying out the vestments for the priests on duty and seeing to the other work of the Sacristan in preparation for each service. She also assisted in flower arranging and many other tasks. She was a member of the Anglican Women's Association and later the Mothers Union.

During the last few years she has continued to assist the Cathedral where her age allowed including providing soup for the soup kitchen, knitting squares to be made into blankets for the poor, and attending the evening weekday service on Mondays until her physical ability made this difficult.

Gerda is a determined old lady who keeps busy as best she can. She has no family in South Africa. Her brother Henk lives in the Netherlands, and Gerda keeps in contact with him by telephone.

Although getting on in age she still lives on her own, looking after herself. This is becoming more and more difficult as her eye-sight deteriorates. She was an avid reader and knitter but sadly these are now activities of the past.

We congratulate Gerda on reaching a remarkable age, and salute her for the work she has done and continues to do supporting the Cathedral. We pray God's blessing on her.


Therefore, we annually challenge our learners to contribute to charitable causes that present themselves to us throughout the year.



Firstly I would like to take this opportunity and give thanks to all those parishioners who attended a strategic meeting for the fund raising and further give thanks to those who had offered themselves to serve in the fund raising committee. We will always keep them in our prayers.

THE IMPORTANCE OF KEEPING TIME FOR SUNDAY CHURCH SERVICE

Time keeping for our Sunday services is a serious problem and is at the level where we need to address it. This is not the first time that we have addressed this problem, my predecessors especially Stephen Grimsley and the clergy, have addressed it before.

Lord Jesus has taught us to pray in two different ways: in secret (alone) or together (two or more people). As we come to worship every Sunday it means we have chosen to pray together. Either praying alone or in a group there will always be rules that are to be followed by each and every participant; one of the key rules will be the starting time. Our order of service for the two services on Sundays starts at 7.30 for the first service and 9.00 for the second service, unless advised otherwise.

It is unfortunate that for some reasons many people are not on time when the service begins and many people arrive after the penitence. Such people have not confessed their sins to God the Almighty and have not asked for forgiveness. *If one hasn't confessed one's sins, one is not supposed to take Communion.* Kindly note that arriving late is disruptive to the whole order of service in that everybody is disturbed by the noise made by the footsteps and we cannot in any circumstances allow late coming. We therefore request with due respect that we should all be seated by the time the services starts.

In conclusion we should pray for the success of the service in that we should pray for everyone that is going to attend, for the president of the service, for the priest who will deliver the sermon, for the other clergy taking part in the service, for the synaxist, for those lay ministers who are on duty, as well as for the readers and servers. Hence I request that we should pray for the observance of the starting time.

SISTER HENRIETTA CSM + AA



Religious nursing pioneer in Southern Africa Henrietta Stockdale was born in England in 1847. At about the time she was confirmed, she committed herself to pray and work for the Bloemfontein diocese, and in 1874 came out to work there with the newly formed Community of St **Michael and All Angels.** In 1877, she offered her life to God as a professed sister in this community. She had trained as a nurse in England and soon went to the diamond fields in Kimberley to run the hospital there. She envisaged the establishment of nursing as a profession for women, and worked to bring this about, by the pattern of hospital administration she provided and the training scheme she set up, as well as by working for legislation that gave the profession recognised status. This remains her legacy

There is a Statue of Sr Henrietta Stockdale, outside St Cyprian's Cathedral Kimberley

As a religious, Henrietta's life in community shaped her disciplined devotion and spirituality. Her love for God found expression in a spirit of joyful service, in a deep concern for the sick, and in her courage and untiring work. Although she was in failing health for many years before her death in 1911, she grew in wisdom, courage and perseverance, so that her particular witness became the offering of her whole life to God.

We commemorate her always on the 6th October.

A WORLDWIDE MOVEMENT TO RELIEVE CHILDREN'S SUFFERING

As seen through the heart and eyes of Mrs Joan Marston

Hospices for children provide palliative care – the care of the body, mind and spirit of a child and their family, facing incurable, life-limiting or life-threatening illness.

Some of these neonates, babies and children live very short lives, and one of our greatest challenges is ensuring newborn babies, who may only live for a few days, are pain-free and comforted in those days. However, children may live for many years with their illness or condition, even to young adulthood, and good management and palliative care, ideally from the time of diagnosis, can ensure that these children enjoy the best possible quality of life.

For many years, the children of Sunflower Children's Hospice taught me so much about the needs and how simple it often is to improve their lives and make them happy. Together with colleagues from 15 countries, in 2005 in Seoul, we established the International Children's Palliative Care Network (ICPCN), and committed to work together, to share knowledge and resources, to try and reach more and more of the estimated 15 million children worldwide who would benefit from children's hospice care, to relieve their suffering.

As the CEO of this organization, now with individual and organizational members in over 100 countries, I have the incredible privilege of travelling to many different countries to support committed and compassionate people who are working tirelessly to relieve the suffering of these children and their families, often with very limited resources.

While much time is spent on advocacy and education, the very best times are spent with the children and families I am taken to meet in some very different environments. It is there that I see how often ordinary people provide extraordinary and complex care with great love. On a recent visit to Moscow, (accompanied by both a translator and a bodyguard!) Our first visit was to a beautiful 4 year-old boy, Alexei, with a rare genetic disorder, cared for perfectly at home on a ventilator by young parents, who had trawled the internet for information and had developed some really innovative ways of providing the best possible care. The next visit was to a single, unemployed mother, living in a poor part of the city, with few resources and little family help, caring for a delightful baby girl with multiple disabilities, with a tracheotomy and on permanent oxygen.

In the slums of Mumbai, we had to literally climb up the outside of a house to reach a topfloor room where a young girl lay dying of a brain tumour. And in a very rural town in the Maharashtra district, it was overwhelming to see the number of families with children with genetic anomalies and cerebral palsy; and children with cancer lying there in pain.


In Minsk, we walked down a forest path to a small house where the mother and the granny were caring for a young girl fast approaching the end of her life, and when I walked out the babushka handed me a beautiful armful of flowers that she grew to sell on the streets to bring in money to care for Yulia.

In Kuala Lumpur we felt the anger of a 17 year old boy who knew he was dying of cancer and vented his rage on his mother. Refusing to take his pain medicines he frustrated the gentle and patient physician who tried every technique to gain his co-operation.

Children I visit in a variety of countries in Asia, Africa, Europe and the Americas have different cultures, religions, and speak different languages. But the experiences of the children and families are very similar. Children suffer pain and other distressing symptoms, feel frustrated, abandoned by God, sad and angry because they cannot play, go to school and do all the things that healthy children can do. Families suffer emotionally and spiritually, knowing their child may die; parents and carers experience physical exhaustion caring all day and often all night; financial resources are drained and siblings often feel neglected. Despite all this, whether visiting a child with AIDS in Jakarta or Kampala; a young person with cancer in Berlin or Buenos Aires; or a baby with a genetic anomaly in Riga or Singapore – we often experience the wonderful love the children receive from family, friends, hospice staff and volunteers – and the love they give in return.

These are the most vulnerable of vulnerable children; they cannot speak for themselves because they are too young, too ill or too disabled. Despite this, each short life has great value; each is made in the image of God and is known and loved by Him; and being with them is a lesson in courage, compassion and above all - love.

Every day, Monday to Friday, a group of ladies take turns in doing a small service to God by feeding a number of poor people with soup and bread. The 'Soup Kitchen' people are **SPECIAL** and each and every one, a child of God. I help on a Tuesday, and look forward to my Tuesday duty. The 'Soup Kitchen' people arrive at the serving hatch in the hall's kitchen, some inadequately dressed for the cold weather (due to being homeless) but each one with a look of great expectation on their faces as they reach out to take their bread and a mug of hot homemade soup which is handed to them. (Homemade thanks to the kindness and generosity of our wonderful parishioners.) They are hungry and now that winter is upon us are cold as well.

Sometimes we are able to give them something extra e.g. bread rolls, popcorn or whatever else has been given to us. **All most gratefully received by one and all.**

It is truly wonderful to be able to do Christian outreach in this way. When you work for God miracles really happen!!! One day we had bread rolls and cold meat given to us which we decided to give them in addition to the soup and bread. But on this particular day the queue went on and on and the bread rolls and cold meat were diminishing rapidly. So with silent prayers we continued handing out to everyone ~ finally the seemingly endless queue came to an end and you've guessed it, there were bread rolls, cold meat, soup and bread left over **AND** everyone in the queue had been fed!!

Talk about the 5 loaves and 2 fish (Matthew 14:18-21.) in helping (in some small way) to be able to give a Their humble position in life truly makes us feel humble.

It's a privilege to be God's instruments little bit of comfort to the needy.






All of us we know what a kite is. A kite can fly very high. Even if you cannot see it, you can still feel it in your hand. The kite is still under your control like when we pray.

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The Music Department of Bloemfontein Cathedral

.....aims to offer musical worship of the highest quality, as befits a Cathedral parish. We are privileged to have, in the Cathedral of St Andrew & St Michael, one of the city's finest examples of religious architecture, and see it as our goal to continue the Anglican tradition of offering to God some of the greatest choral music of the past, as well as contemporary music that is seemly and proper to this place, respecting the dignity and solemnity of the people and clergy, and ever aiming to provide a haven from the transient and insubstantial distractions that often infests our daily lives. The Director of Music and Cathedral Organist share the values of the Cathedral Clergy and Chapter, and indeed the Laity, in recognising that we are part of a great tradition that began in this Diocese over a century ago, and that will continue for many generations to come. Although the act of singing and playing music is ever new, divine worship has a responsibility that secular music does not; every note sung represents the prayers of the Christian soul to God, and also, even unwittingly, of the non-believer who visits this Cathedral, in his/her search for the truth. Sacred music is always addressed to the Creator, but also, in the imperfection of human performance, represents our striving for something greater than ourselves. In this we as musicians have an added responsibility to our fellow worshippers, that our music not be frivolous, mediocre or slavish to fashions, but instead a sincere and honest continuation of the marvellous, festive and joyful tradition we subscribe to as Anglicans.

The Cathedral Singers have duties approximately once a month at the Sunday morning Eucharist, and from time to time at major festivals such as All Souls' Day and Advent Sunday. The repertoire consists largely of Latin mass setting and anthems proper to the service and Church calendar. The repertoire is mostly *a capella*, which develops a keen ear and sense of ensemble and tuning. We are fortunate to have a keen group of very fine string players who play Viennese classical masses occasionally. This ensemble is called the Cathedral Mozart Players, and consists principally of students and staff affiliated to the Odeion School of Music. At other times, the Cathedral Choir sings the music at the Eucharist, except for the third Sunday of the month, when more informal hymns are chosen for the Family Service.

The Odeion Choir is the departmental training vocal ensemble, and a handful of members also volunteer to sing Choral Evensong at 4pm during term. Some of these students are conducting students at the Odeion School, and have the opportunity to direct the choir during



these services. The music in these services is mostly written by English composers, as Choral Evensong is an exclusively Anglican service, and composers of other denomination do not write music for this office. Nevertheless, because of the meditative nature and brevity of the service, wherein the congregation is largely passive, Evensong does enjoy an appeal to those beyond the boundaries of the Anglican Church, and affords people an opportunity to hear this music in its natural home, as it does not fit into any other service, and almost all of it, being particularly closely bound to the liturgy, is unsuitable for any concert programme.

The Cathedral is privileged at this time to enjoy the use of the University's Allen organ, which creates a further link between the Odeion and the Cathedral. This digital organ is a three manual instrument, and allows a wide patina of sounds, in order to accommodate a variety of musical styles.

Membership of any of the three choirs are open to any person, whether a member of the Cathedral Parish or not. Some choristers sing in all three ensembles, with good results. The requirements for membership in the Cathedral Choir are a good ear and a willingness to learn to read music. The requirements for joining the Cathedral Singers are an intermediate level of music reading and some choral experience, and a capacity for quick musical learning. The Odeion Choir requires its members to be fairly fluent sight-readers, and to be engaged in musical activity such as playing another instrument and/or solo singing in other ensembles. However, it is essential that all choristers are committed and passionate individuals with both a feeling for teamwork and a realisation of the vision that the choirs share with the clergy and the laity. Also essential is a sense of humour, as both the Director of Music and Cathedral Organist (and the existing choristers, for that matter) suffer from that typically Anglican affliction of being unable to resist indulging in terrible puns at the slightest opportunity.

All three choirs are commissioned by the Parish Council, the Liturgical Committee and the Dean; this last is also the Patron of the Choirs, to whom the Director of Music and Organist report. At present both the Cathedral Organist (NicolViljoen) and the Director of Music (Lance Phillip) are staff members of the Odeion School of Music. Professor Viljoen is the Chair, and Lance Phillip is a Junior Lecturer.

Cathedral, in which one can feel the sense of a building soaked in prayer. I very much appreciated the music, which enhanced our act of worship. After the service it was a joy to re-connect with people I had met before and meet new faces.



Obviously, things have changed since I last visited. We have had the pleasure of entertaining Fr Lazarus as well as Bishop Dintoe and his wife in the UK in the meanwhile and were delighted that two such hard working and dedicated priests should have been chosen as Dean and Bishop within the Diocese of the Free State.



An example of their dedication and self-giving was evident on the following day when we joined both of them on their official "day off" on a visit to Thaba Nchu to visit Fr Freddy Mothibi and his wife on which we were accompanied by Fr David Rakoena, and we were honoured to share the splendid lunch they provided. Bishop Dintoe explained that this was part of an initiative to affirm the retired clergy in the valuable work they continue to do.

From what I saw and heard over my time in the diocese the Bishop does not have an easy task. He is fortunate to have the willing and wholehearted support of Dean Lazarus; but even these two with the best will in the world cannot tackle all the challenges which the Church faces.







Since I was last here we have moved from the Diocese of Blackburn to the Diocese of York and my parish of Cottingham has historic links with the Church in Ghana. Wherever we look we find fewer full-time ordained ministers and pressing financial problems.

In this situation the realistic practical and financial support of all members of the Church is vital. Please think prayerfully about how you could help. How about some hours of driving time to help take the pressure off the Bishop on the long journeys he makes. And the clergy we love do need to be paid as they need to live. Green may seem a pretty colour to line the collection basket but will not on its own provide for the basic needs of providing priestly ministry.

Fr Lazarus took me on some home visits during my time here which I was able to give communion and anoint the sick and housebound and be the recipient of their most generous hospitality.




I am writing this as we prepare to return home. We hope that eleven years will not pass before we visit again, and we hope to see some of you in the UK in the intervening period.



<u>The second chain is for longer more chronic needs</u> – those who have difficult problems or illnesses which have to be hospitalised for longer or are perhaps in more and constant need for a longer period - this is run by me, **Delysia Hoehne.**

It would be impossible for me to tell you of all the wonderful successes those who pray have achieved. My friends who ask for prayers are as extremely enthusiastic as I am about this list – many have had comfort, solace of healing and just that warm feeling of "knowing you have help" by bringing your requests to God in prayer. Try this sometime!

If you have requests please let me know and I will keep your request on my list for a month or two (or longer by request.) Please give us regular updates of the people you put on the list. These lists are brought out monthly and available at the back of the church in a box marked "Prayer Requests". "Take Time to pray". Anyone may take them for their use.




Chirp from the Editor:
