

ARE WE SPIRITUALLY ANOREXIC?





Dear friends in Christ

In my experience as a priest, I have discovered that if you want anything to happen spontaneously, then you need to organise it.

Dr. Paul Siaki once said "The height of insanity is to do the same old things the same old way and expect different results". I think this is our own GAD (General Anglican Disease). We all have a natural, innate appetite for God and spiritual things, but we may not be experiencing the sensations that would tell us that we are hungering for Him. **Why not?** Maybe it's because we have been depriving ourselves of spiritual food for way too long. **Are we refusing to feed ourselves spiritually? How often do you pray or read your Bible?** If we don't actively seek God and instead ignore this yearning from deep inside, cravings can, and do, eventually change and disappear.

When we are physically hungry, our bodies send us signals through our hunger pangs and cravings that tell us we need to eat. If ignored, these signals at first grow stronger in hope of pushing us to fulfil the need for food. But if we continue to ignore this appetite for long enough, it will eventually begin to fade and we can actually convince ourselves that we really aren't hungry anymore. That is exactly what the anorexic does. One tells him/herself I'm not hungry and ignores the signal the body is sending. Eventually one will have completely numbed the cravings to the point that we no longer desire food. We have so effectively convinced ourselves that we are not hungry that our bodies are now starving to death. Yet we don't even realise the danger.

Hence we need to be honest with ourselves in realising our Spiritual needs. I believe St. Augustine was right when he stated "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, our heart is restless until it rests in you".

This is how it can be with our spiritual appetite. When we are spiritually hungry, we experience the beckoning of the Holy Spirit within us to feast on the things of God. If we ignore our craving for God long enough, we will find the craving for Him eventually begins to fade and die. We are capable of convincing ourselves that we are doing just "fine," yet we are starving our spirit to the point of spiritual death.

Our desires for the things of God fade, and we are no longer able to experience the pull of the Holy Spirit because we have so numbed ourselves to His call. Without even noticing it, prayer has become less important, we no longer thirst after God's Word, and we convince ourselves it's no big deal to miss church now and again.

Both types of anorexics refuse themselves the nourishment they need to sustain life. The only way for both of them to heal and regain a healthy appetite that will help them grow is to pull up to the table and eat. Are we feasting at the banquet table of God? If we want to cultivate and grow our spiritual craving, we must feed it. Psalm 34:8 says, "Taste and see that the Lord is good".

Look out Idols, here comes Molly!



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Following an informative talk on Sexual Abuse given to the AWF ladies in May, it was decided that this information should be spread further afield.

Priscilla Monyobo, a forensic nurse specialist, spoke of the

Domestic Violence Act which protects both men and women. There are different kinds of abuse, namely: physical, sexual, emotional, (psychological) and harassment. All of these forms of abuse are covered under this Act. Drugs and alcohol can also exacerbate abuse. Rape can affect your mind, body and your feelings. Unfortunately time is the greatest healer. One must not be afraid to ask for help from your friends or family. Abused people can also suffer eating disturbances, guilt, insomnia, thoughts of suicide or panic attacks which could affect their school work or employment. Please look out for these and other symptoms which could indicate abuse.

There are usually 6 stages of recovery, but these could happen in any order.

- 1) Denial it didn't happen to me
- 2) Apathy confused awareness- is it my fault? What is it that I am feeling?
- 3) Loss of trust in others; low self-worth. What if I feel like I just can't "get over it?" How do I take care of myself?
- 4) Anger why me?
- 5) Depression I am worthless
- 6) Clarity of feelings and moving on I will not let this crime control me

Every rape survivor takes a different amount of time to heal emotionally. Some do it quickly and some take years. Rape survivors need their supporters to be patient and give them the time and support that they need. Emotional abuse is the worst form of abuse as it leaves no physical scars. There is a cycle of abuse: After the abuse the perpetrator could be very apologetic and buy the abused flowers or jewellery to "make up" for the abuse (the honeymoon phase), but then falls back into the cycle of abusing. This causes much tension in a household.

Priscilla hopes that people would feel free to disclose to a priest at their church, and anyone dealing with abused people needs to be very sympathetic and able just to listen, and not judge. In the black culture there is still the patriarchal system, where what the father says, goes. This can lead to abuse and the covering up of it. This should not be allowed. Mothers should also teach their sons to respect women; also to play with dolls, and daughters to play with cars – in other words to bring up all children equally, with no differentiation between sexes.

Wonder Moadira was the next speaker and she works as a NPA at Thuthuzela, which means comfort. Thuthuzela is a one-stop centre where Social Development, Child Welfare, SAPS and the Department of Health are available. The very first thing an abused victim should do is make contact with the police, so that evidence can be obtained. Wonder gives support to all victims of sexual abuse, and does follow-ups with them to see that all is progressing as it should. She is the link between the court and the victim.

She goes to crèches, high schools and even clinics to make people aware that abuse is not on, in any shape or form.

Sister Seekoei also works at Thuthuzela. She takes evidence from the victims and blood from the accused. She works with traumatized children of 18 years and younger. These children could be abused or even neglected. Neglect is also a reportable offence. Children are calmed so that they can properly describe what had happened to them. Sometimes the children have to be removed from the parent's home as the abuser is often from home. There is a place of safety for children and adults; the maximum time one is able to stay there is 3 months. She also helps the victims during the line-up parade. After you have been raped, it is important that you get health care as quickly as possible. This is to enable you to get medical care, treatment and advice, and also to collect evidence.

There are certain things that have to be followed after an abuse:

- 1) Phone the nearest police. They do have a Family Child Protection Unit, formed for this express purpose. If you don't want to contact the police, one could go directly to Thuthuzela that can be found at the National Hospital. You are entitled to refuse any examination, but this would allow the abuser to possibly go unpunished.
- 2) DO NOT WASH YOURSELF
- 3) DO NOT GO TO THE TOILET. This can also remove evidence.
- **4)** Bring any articles of clothing, sheets, towels etc that could have been contaminated by the perpetrator. This can be used as evidence.
- 5) You have to report to someone within 72 hours; the evidence will not be viable after that.

Once that has been completed, you might want to do a pregnancy test, an HIV test, a hepatitis B test and a test for sexually transmitted diseases (STD's). There are "morning after pills" that can prevent one from falling pregnant after sexual abuse.

When someone comes to Thuthuzela, they are given a comfort pack containing a panty, soap, hand lotion, toothbrush and toothpaste in a bag. This is an effort to try and make the abused feel better about themselves. Sometimes clothes are also given out, as a victim may be brought there with no or very little clothing on.

Men also need to be helped. They have traditionally always been the head of the household, but after 1994 women have been empowered and equality can disrupt the conventional way of life. Male victims need to be given the same treatment (physical or emotional) as women and children.



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THE CATHEDRAL'S MINISTRY AT ST. BEDE'S CHAPELRY SOUTPAN: REFLECTIONS

1 Introduction

For some time past, **the Cathedral Parish** has been responsible for **a "Chapelry" in Soutpan**, about 60 kms from Bloemfontein. Though the activities there have been brisk, little is known by the Cathedral parishioners whose generous contributions, in money and in kind, have helped in "**seeking the one lost sheep"**, as the scripture teaches us. This 'reflections' is meant to inform and thank our congregation for their efforts to spread the Gospel to the people of Soutpan.

2 Background information of St. Bede's Chapelry

The Chapel was earlier placed under the tutelage of St. Peter's. However, Bishop Patrick decided to transfer it to the Cathedral. There was then litigation between the Diocese and the Catholic Church in the area as to the rightful ownership of the Chapel since the two denominations (Anglican and Catholic) had been worshipping together in the chapel. The Diocese won the case and renovations amounting to over R45, 000. 00 were made to the Chapel with funds, mainly, from our Link Diocese, Blackburn. The then Bishop of Blackburn (BoB) visited the country at a later stage and Bp. Patrick delegated Frs. Amos and Albert to accompany the BoB to Soutpan to avail himself with the progress made in our ministry. Apart from the photographs that the Bp took, he visited some of the members in their homes, took lively pictures with them, ostensibly, to show to the people of Blackburn the good work done with their contributions. The current attendance is about 20 and 15 elderly and children respectively.

3 Activities in the Chapelry

- Sunday Services Church services are conducted in the Chapel every Sunday. However, the Eucharist is administered once every month in the second week of the month. During the time of Fr. Don the Clergy took turns to visit and participate in the service till Fr. Albert was formally licensed by Bp. Patrick on 19 October 2010 as Priest-in-Charge (PiC) of the Chapelry. The services, usually, start at 12 noon since the designated priest is bound to worship in the Cathedral before travelling to Soutpan (a distance of about 60 kms.) a telling situation for the Priest and the congregation. Funeral and burial services are also conducted when the need arises.
- *Mentorship of Priests and Deacons* The Chapelry, one way or the other, serves as part of the mentoring process for new Priests and Deacons. Frs. Joshua, Amos, Albert, Ernest and Deacon Sam used the chapel as part of their training.
- *Confirmation Service* For the first time in the Diocese, a chapelry (and only in the St. Bede's Chapel) confirmation service was conducted by Bp. Patrick assisted by the Cathedral Clergy. Eight people were confirmed in 2010. The Bishop was so impressed that he wrote to thank the Council for progress made in ministering at the chapel.
- *Visit by the Cluster Mothers' Union* In an attempt to re-invigorate the fledgling Mother's Union, the Bloemfontein Cluster Mother's Union scheduled one of their annual meetings at St. Bede's. The meeting was preceded by a procession through the principal streets of the town with singing and dancing.
- *The Cathedral Men's Fellowship* The above has made, at least, three visits to the Chapel, one to join in their worship as a form of encouragement and two Saturdays (accompanied by Madam Trudie of Mosamaria) in order to help introduce vegetable gardening in an effort to make the chapel financially sustainable.

4. Financial situation of St. Bede's Chapel

Through the efforts of the PiC the Chapel serves as a pay-point for pensioners in and around the town, yielding a monthly income of R500.00. The current financial position of the Chapelry is about **R 30,000.00.** Much as this figure appears laudable, the situation is not sustainable. There have been a series of attempts by other churches to offer the same facility but by the grace of God, and through the efforts of the PiC, both Absa and, lately, South African Social Security Agency (SASSA) have brushed off the intrigues from various competitors.

5. Current challenges facing the Chapelry

- *Unstable membership*. Total membership remains unclear following the exodus of most of the members to join a charismatic church that emerged recently;
- *Times of visit by Cathedral Priests*. The current visit is limited to once every month and service starts at 12 noon, a situation the members and the Priests find discomforting. Various presentations have been made to that effect.
- *Inadequate financial commitment.* Collections and pledges hover around R100 to R200 monthly.
- *The Mother's Union.* Since the organization's membership is composed of very old women, over 60 yrs of age, it is gradually becoming extinct.

6. Attempts made to resolve some of the challenges

- A two-pronged recruitment drive has been initiated: a) House-to-house visits to old and prospective members. 2) The Cathedral Men's Fellowship is exploring the possibility of initiating a Youth Training Programme in and around Soutpan with a possible government.
- Since Anglican worship is "priestly-centred" the request to increase the Sunday visits to two per month to boost attendance was granted and the Lord Bishop has designated Fr. Ernest in this regard.

7. Acknowledgements

The Dean, the Clergy, the Cathedral Council and the Congregation of St. Bede's take this opportunity to thank the following for their immense contribution to the Chapelry:

- The Cathedral Congregation for taking the responsibility to provide the "elements" for the Eucharist and bearing the transport cost of the visiting Priest;
- The Cathedral Men's Fellowship for a series of visits made to the area to join in the worship and to help in raising awareness of vegetable gardening as a form of income for the Chapelry and individual members and also attempts to introduce an Internet Café as a means of helping the Soutpan Community to combat youth unemployment;
- Mrs. Trudie Harrison of Mosamaria in teaching the members how to raise vegetable gardening;
- **Mr. Solly Mattins of the Chapel** in donating a Chalice for the Eucharist at the cost of over R1000.00
- Fr. Albert for donating five specially designed blankets bearing the insignia of the Diocesan Mothers Union at a cost of R 1,5000 for five senior citizens from the Chapel and R 500.00 towards the Cave Service on behalf of the Chapel.

WOULD YOU BE A KING OR A QUEEN?



Image and Likeness

God said: let us make man in our image, after our likeness..., "KJV. Genesis 1:26".

The Hebrew word for "image" and "likeness" is interesting. In simple terms the word

"image (Hebrew – tse lehm) " means we should "look like" God and "likeness (Hebrew – demooth) means we should "function like" God. Really? Yep! The same stuff in Him is now in you.

A King's Mentality

KJV.1 Timothy 6: 12-16 says,......"Which in His times He shall shew – who is the blessed and only Potentate, the King of kings, and Lord of lords". If Jesus is the King of kings, who do you think those kings are? God called us because we are created in His image and likeness, we look and function like Him! He is the Most High and we are just high, just kings. We are rulers of this entire planet! This planet was made to obey the sons and daughters of the Most High God! Jesus said," Is it not written in your law, Ye are gods?" (KJV. John 10: 31-35). I have said, Ye are gods; and all of you are children of the Most High, (KJV. Psalm 82:6). This is much the same as us adding the word "junior" when we name children after ourselves. They are like us and do everything we do.

If we do not know who we are, we are subject to act like anybody. But if we understand that we are gods and kings in Christ Jesus, then we will act like Jesus. That is what the devil is afraid of, and it is what all of creation is crying out to see!

Our minds must be renewed to the full understanding of our position in God. Imagine how big an impact you would make in church and the community if you engaged in full, all of your powers as one of God's juniors! The problem is conforming to the pattern of the world (KJV. Romans 12:2).

What sort of Priest, Lay Minister, Sides Person, AWF, Men's Fellowship, Council or Choir member would you really be if you recognised and used all your "likeness" powers as God junior? It's like buying a top of the range cellphone or car and then using only 5% of its features, because you do not read the manual (in our case not consulting with the Word of our Father all the time).

Kings refuse to be labelled, boxed or dictated to on worldly terms but only by the Spirit. Kings believe all things are possible with God (KJV. Mark 10:27). You are more than conquerors, and I will ALWAYS cause you to triumph (KJV. Romans 8:37 and 2 Corinthians 2:14). We are to live as citizens of Heaven and kings of the Earth.

Living like a King

Have you ever seen a **good** king or queen cursing people out, being anti-social or unkind, poor and barely making it, whose children beg? When we think of kings and queens we get "images" of majestic and powerful people! Yes there are those kings and queens placed above ourselves here on earth for order (governments, royalty, chieftains, supervisors and managers etc), but in the Spirit realm, boy/honey, we all qualify for the high life in Jesus Christ. We cannot settle for less. If unsure, check this scripture out, "…reign as kings in life through the one Man Jesus Christ" (KJV. Romans 5:17). Also, (KJV. Revelation 1: 5-6) "…and hath made us kings and priests unto God and His Father".

The real impact of God's kings and queens

When God taps one of His kings or queens on the shoulder and says, it's time for you to bankroll the Bazaar, Bingo Evening, Sunflower Bills, Mosamaria etc, or stand for Council Elections, real kings and queens don't get scared or confused and say "But I cannot afford it, I don't have the time, I'm not smart, I'm weak or I've got too much baggage". All humility expended, late-coming in church is wrong and must stop. <u>Let's say kings are never late for war, they prepare for it!</u> Your trip to church should be a mission to "trample the lion and adder under feet" (KJV. Psalm 91.13). So fix your Spirit, Soul, Body, Bath, Clothing, Car, Bicycle, Taxi (Fare & Route) in <u>TIME</u>, to be ready to banish the devil to his pit in a Spirit-filled worship. Like the Israelites coming from Egypt, it was just them and God in that desert, uninterrupted Spiritual connection. Beloved, I wish above all things that thou mayest prosper and be in health, even as thy soul prospereth. (KJV. 3 John 1:2). **Amen.**

"I am a pirate and I'm taking over this ship!" Ben knew he was a pirate, because he had the T-shirt – and was wearing it. He put his hands on his hips, puffed out his chest and commanded Nigel, the tiller man, to yield the ship. The ship in question was the Kingfisher, a narrow boat on the Leeds-Lancaster Canal. For Diane's special birthday, we had packed the boat with a selection of her family and friends and set off from Barton Grange to 'Th Owd Tithe Barn' for lunch. All Diane's grandchildren were on board, including the latest, Callum, although he was focused as usual on food and sleep. Ben had spent some time in the bow being a pirate; I confess a Granddad may have suggested the stern was where the command of the boat was held. So we worked our way down to the stern, Ben rose to his full height (!) and issued the command. The result was hilarious. Nigel stepped forward and said 'Of course – here's the tiller.', and invited Ben to take it. Ben was instantly transformed from the swashbuckling and assertive pirate to a confused and worried small boy. Backing away, he stammered 'No!' Nigel stepped forward a little and repeated 'Come on – you can steer the boat – you can stand on the box here.' (The box was precisely for small people to stand on to take the tiller.) 'I need my Daddy', blurted out the pirate and fled to his uncle Carl.

Subsequently, all four of the older grandchildren had a go steering the boat. Euan and Zach took it in their stride, but rapidly returned to a Lego movie in the bow, Aedan and Maayana took multiple turns, mostly politely. Maayana had a tendency to snatch the tiller and turn into the bank, so Nigel would have to keep a firm hold on the tiller; Aedan grasped immediately the 'turn to the left to go right' principle and blossomed under Nigel's tutelage: 'He's a natural.' But the pirate never took command of the ship.

We've been covering the Lord's Prayer in a couple of local schools and got to the phrase 'Thy will be done'. Using the parable of the two sons in the vineyard, dressed up a little, (one says he will help in the vineyard, but doesn't, the other says he won't, but does — we make it a story about helping Dad or Mum in the garden) we looked at *doing* God's will, rather than just *saying* you'll do it. It is easy to puff ourselves up, rise to our full height and to say we're a Christian — so much harder to *do* it, especially when it's frightening, costly or embarrassing.

It's not a new problem. St James once wrote to his congregation "Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says." (The Bible, James 1.22) I remember being challenged by a preacher with "If the police arrested you tonight for being a Christian, would they find enough evidence to convict you?" Being a Christian is about following Christ as our Lord and Saviour in every part of our life, not just Sundays. They are called Sunday Services because as an act of worship, they are meant to help us, to service us, as followers of Jesus. The fellowship, the prayers, the teaching all help to remind us how to live Monday to Saturday. We live out our Christian witness in the way we won't take short cuts or descend to common industry practice just because 'everyone else does', in the way we give our time freely even when we'd rather not, when we go the extra mile (a phrase from Jesus) in serving those around us. Sometimes there are the 'grand', the 'big' moments for standing up and being counted as His followers; most of the time, it is the way we tackle the mundane, the everyday, the way we are there for our children, our spouse, our community, our employer. We need to be reminded how and why we serve as the people of God: we attend Services to be serviced that we may be a service to others.

Jesus demonstrated this in every part of his life – and death – but poignantly when he washed the feet of the disciples. Foot washing was the lowest task anyone could undertake. It's hard to understand how demeaning it was, how you declared yourself to be the lowest in the pecking order because feet were associated with dominion. But despite the connotations, with no disciple willing to wash even the feet of Jesus, it was Jesus who rose, unrobed, knelt and washed the feet of his errant disciples, one of whom would shortly betray him, one, the leader, would formally deny him, and none would stand by him to the end as he died, leaving that task to women and second order disciples.

Before followers of Jesus were called 'Christians', they were called 'Followers of the Way', a way of service, a way of doing as well as hearing and saying. We need to step up – and we need to do what we say, or we'll be like a small pirate, never taking control of the ship.

The Feast of Corpus Christi

Today, Thursday 19 June 2014, marks the Feast of Corpus Christi (Latin for Body of Christ). It is also known as Corpus Domini. It is a rite that memorates the tradition and belief in the body and blood of Jesus Christ and His Real Presence in the Eucharist. It stresses the joy of the institution of the Eucharist, which was observed on Maundy Thursday, eve of the Good Friday. Apostle Paul in his First Letter to the Corinthians (11: 23) refers to it as a tradition "received from the Lord which I also passed on to you... and whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes". The Feast is celebrated on the Thursday after the Trinity Sunday.

The institution of Corpus Christi as a feast is credited to a Belgian Nun, Juliana, who developed a special veneration for the Blessed Sacrament. This was enhanced by a vision of the Church under the appearance of the full moon having one dark spot, which was interpreted to be the absence of a dedicated anniversary for the institution of the Holy Eucharist in the Liturgical calendar. In 1208 Juliana had a vision of our Lord in which she was asked to plead for the institution of the feast of Corpus Christi. The vision was repeated 20 years later and in 1246 a synod was convened and order made for the celebration of Corpus Christi as a dedicated annual event.

The celebration of the feast of Corpus Christi, usually, takes the form of a procession through the principal streets of the town with the Blessed Sacrament displayed in a monstrance. The procession is followed by the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament and a prayer, the Divine Praises. For example, in the Vatican, the Pope presides over an Eucharistic procession that begins at the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran through the principal street to the Basilica of St. Mary Major, where it ends with the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. In Ghana, the author's home country, tents are erected at conspicuous places around the principal streets and the Blessed Sacrament carried in a palanquin (what is used to carry kings on special occasions) amidst singing and dancing and whistle-stops at the tents where the Priest administers the Benediction with the prayer, Divine Praises. Carrying the Blessed Sacrament in a palanquin is meant to depict the Kingship of our Lord.

What is the significance of the celebration of the feast of Corpus Christi, one may ask? The importance of the celebration of the feast can be found in what the Eucharist emphasizes which, according to Friar Sydney Mascarenhas, are:

• The proclamation of the Suffering, Death and Resurrection of Christ, and also the Suffering, Death and Resurrection of the group brought together in His name;

- Not only do we also proclaim that Jesus Christ is the Way, the Truth and the Life of the world but also proclaim that the group celebrating the Eucharist is the Way, the Truth and the Life of the world;
- Not only do we proclaim that Jesus Christ is the Living Bread given for the world.
 We also proclaim that we, Christians throughout the world, are Life given for the world.

Perhaps, one can also add that the celebration of the Eucharist serves as a reminder of the Second coming of Christ, which was pointed out by Jesus Himself, and Paul makes it more emphatic thus: "Every time you eat this Bread and drink from this Cup you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes". Furthermore, the elements bread and wine, taken in faith, is a symbol that God feeds the soul, as the Eucharistic Prayer reads: "...we offer you, Father, this life-giving bread...this saving cup". In other words, as bread and drink revitalize and strengthen the physical body, so in the bread and wine God gives life, strength, and joy to the spirit of the partakers of the Holy Communion. Friends, it behoves on us to continue to preserve the sacredness of the Eucharist as the Early Church scrupulously revered. It should not be looked upon as a mere symbol. As St. Ignatius wrote in AD 107, the Eucharist is the Real Presence of Christ. For example, there is a legend that St. Anthony of Padua (dubbed "Wonder Worker") was once going to offer the Holy Communion to the sick at home after an early morning Mass. When crossing the road, a shepherd with a herd of sheep ignored the "host" being carried by the Saint but the sheep, collectively, knelt on their legs and waited till the Sacred Mystery crossed over. Again, there is another legend that an 'unbelieving' communicant, apparently, to deride the contention that the wafer, when consecrated by the Priest becomes 'real' Body of Christ (Ignatius' Real Presence claim) did not swallow it but buried it. On looking back, the wafer was ascending in the form of vapour. Another legend has it that a priest in Bolsena and his congregation witnessed a Eucharist miracle of a bleeding consecrated host (the Priest wafer) that is raised during consecration.

Our calling as Christians, in our today's world is awesome. Can we, honestly, say that we are beacons of Light for those who are groping in darkness, or the Ray of Truth in a world full of gossip and mudslinging? Are we really signs of creative Life amidst rotten and difficult situations, or the clear running waters yearned for by the people of this our earth planet? Indeed the Body of Christ was pierced so that streams of Living Waters could quench the thirst of all the peoples of this earth. Come, let us pray by joining in the hymn composed by St. Thomas Aquinas for the Blessed Sacrament, *O Salutaris Hostia*, which occasionally, I use to 'preface' the Peace Greetings:

"O Saving Victim, opening wide the gate of heaven to man below, our foes press on from every side; thine aid supply, thy strength bestow". Amen.

ANGLICANS ABLAZE CONFERENCE 2014: HOPE IS RISING



Wow, where does one start after a week like that? We arrived in Bryanston, at the New Life Church at 14H00 on Wednesday. Registration went by quickly and before we knew it we were up and registered. We saw familiar faces and new faces. We were welcomed by one of the most energetic bishops, **Bishop Steve of Johannesburg diocese** and then a Praise and Worship that one did not think the Anglican Church could have (thus was held back a bit).

There were break away sessions for the youth and I attended them with great anticipation. The first one was titled 'let justice roll' and was presented by Nancy Njagi from Kenya. 'Let justice roll' meant that we, the youth, should roll out the Good News to our communities not just by word but by actions as well. She taught us that the Bible does speak of Social development, Isaiah 58:6-14. Let justice roll in our community. She made us aware that we had a responsibility as the youth of the Anglican Church. She went on to speak about Mathew 25:31-46, saying that we should love God and our neighbour. Without love as Christians there is nothing we can do.

Thursday came and that period that I did not know about the church came, praise and worship. Man did this session melt me every time. Then the keynote address was by the Archbishop of Canterbury. I remember thinking wow he is young... young to be Arch! He then took the microphone and I thought wow! I am not going to lie - half of the address I spent being star-struck. I did not think I would get to meet him, so when we broke off for the youth service and he was addressing us I made sure to wake up this time. We don't have to be part of the board to help; we can have afternoon classes to help kids with their homework. While this might pose as a challenge for the Cathedral as we are based in town and the need might not be that much, but we can always roll out the project in the location with the aid of other parishes. The education need is there and we can improve it.

Friday came, the youth session was held by Nancy Njagi and Oscar Muriu. These two are a powerful combination. Their message was that we as the youth must stand our ground. Stop being "bullied by our peers". We should be able to stand for our faith. We should stop saying that the Anglican Church is boring and running away to other churches. We should be the change we want to see within the Anglican Church. Let us grow each other in faith and within the church. They said that the youth is the church of tomorrow but the church of today. The time is NOW and we should start acting.

The church is growing and so is the demand for spiritual growth. With that said the world is also in rapid growth and we are said to be in the era of technology. Thus one of the workshops was on social media. In South Africa, Facebook is the biggest social network. We then went into discussing how the Church can use these sites to reach to the spiritual need of the church and the country. My Anglican, a site the church has set up to keep a data base of the Anglican churches and its membership, Interesting!

The highlight of Thursday was the youth celebration...need I say more? Guitar, drums, young people. Let's just say the roof was on fire!

Before one knew it was Saturday and the week was over. We had a Eucharist, the only way Anglicans that are on Fire know how. Indeed hope is rising and we the young people have to play an active role within the church. The week was indeed an eye-opener and really caused one to introspect of their role in the church. We are all challenged to live an active Church life. If each person that attended Ablaze made two people disciples and those two made two, how many people would attend the 2016 Ablaze? My question to that challenge is: what are we waiting for? Two people each in a year...lets go!
