

Dear friends in Christ

Some saints have been venerated for nearly the entire history of Christianity. *Cosmas and Damien are two such mysterious heroes of the faith.* All we know about them for sure is that their names are recorded in the Eucharistic Prayer of the Mass in the Roman Catholic Church. Legend however, holds they were twin brothers who practised medicine in Syria. Competent physicians, they were called "moneyless ones" because they didn't charge for their services. Perhaps that miracle alone is enough to keep them remembered for more than sixteen hundred years.

This got me thinking: if you have a particular talent or trade, do you ever give it away or do we always expect to be paid for our services? We live in the world of entitlement and we always ask what is due to me? We always want to receive instead of giving. Sometimes we lose sight of the fact that we have been given our talents and abilities not to store up earthly treasures, but for the good of all humanity.

We always say, "But we have worked hard for what we have". We may object and feel that we deserve to be paid for the work done. That is true and nobody, not even saints, would say you have to give away everything. But giving is not an obligation, it is a way to say thank you to God for all you have. As the gospel of Matthew says, "Freely you received, freely give." (Matthew 10:8) When we give, we not only bless others, but also acknowledge the fact that we have been blessed.

There is no limit to the amount which the Church needs to advance the Kingdom of God. Churches that accept this principle find that they can give to Missions and benevolences one to two hundred percent of their current Church expenses. However, we know that OUR GREATEST NEED is not "how much our Church needs", but rather "HOW MUCH WE NEED TO GIVE".

Increased giving as has been proven many times over will develop greatly increased interest in our Church and in our spiritual lives. Every family should look upon this call to Stewardship as the opportunity to make the greatest sacrifice of their lifetime for their faith. Therefore as your parish council we are making every effort to set the example with generous sacrificial pledges to inspire all our families to become better givers.

This is a challenge to all of us! It is a Call to service and Christian Stewardship, which offers each of us an opportunity to measure up to our Christian obligation and responsibility. On the foundation stones of Faith, Prayer and Sacrifice we will build success. Let us give as God hath prospered us.

September was the month of Creation and thank you for the cleaning operation in the community you live. October was the month of Stewardship, and all sermons were focused on "Theological reflection and Financial sustainability". The needs of the Church are increasing beyond the contribution we are making and we are being challenged to look at the future of our Church. On the 26th October it was our Dedication Sunday and I hope we will rededicate ourselves and our talents to the Lord. I've realized that many of our members have not yet brought back their dedication forms, so I appeal to everyone to return them as quickly as possible so as to help the PCC to do budgeting for 2015 based on the cash projections promised on the forms. It is vital that we budget correctly, and it would be so good to be able to budget without having to depend on all the fund raising efforts to balance the books. We should be able to break even on pledges, and then do FUN raising for more Outreach programmes etc. Let us this year, all thank God for the gifts He has given us, and maybe then we might be blessed with a balanced budget.




A thoughtful little girl broke the hushed silence, 'I think I'd throw up.'





Advent-tide and Christmas-tide Greetings 2014



Advent which begins on November 30th this year, is the season when we call to mind the terrible situation that the world was in before Jesus came. Only by appreciating it can we celebrate with proper joy Jesus' coming on that first Christmas.

It is my prayer that the Lord will reveal to us our eternal destiny and help us to attain this destiny.

The Captain lit a lantern and suddenly caught his breath and went numb with shock. In the dim light, he saw the face of the soldier. It was his own son. The boy had been studying music in the South when the war broke out. Without telling his father, the boy enlisted in the Confederate Army. The following morning, heartbroken, the father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial, despite his enemy status. His request was only partially granted. The Captain had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for his son at the funeral. The request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate. But, out of respect for the father, they did say they could give him only one musician. The Captain chose a bugler. He asked the bugler to play a series of musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform. This wish was granted. The haunting melody, we now know as 'The Last Post' used at military funerals was born.

CHRISTIAN GIVING

ARE YOU GIVING A FAIR PORTION OF YOUR INCOME TO GOD?

Question: "What does the Bible say about Christian tithing? Should a Christian tithe?"

Answer: Many Christians struggle with the issue of tithing. In some churches giving is overemphasized. At the same time, many Christians refuse to submit to the biblical exhortations about making offerings to the Lord. Tithing/giving is intended to be a joy and a blessing. Sadly, that is sometimes not the case in the church today.

Tithing is an Old Testament concept. The tithe was a requirement of the Law in which the Israelites were to give 10 percent of the crops they grew and the livestock they raised to the tabernacle/temple (Leviticus 27:30; Numbers 18:26; Deuteronomy 14:24; 2 Chronicles 31:5).

In fact, the Old Testament Law required multiple tithes—one for the Levites, one for the use of the temple and the feasts, and one for the poor of the land—which would have pushed the total to around 23.3 percent. Some understand the Old Testament tithe as a method of taxation to provide for the needs of the priests and Levites in the sacrificial system.

The New Testament nowhere commands, or even recommends, that Christians submit to a legalistic tithe system. The New Testament nowhere designates a percentage of income a person should set aside, but only says gifts should be "in keeping with income" (1 Corinthians 16:2).

Some in the Christian church have taken the 10 percent figure from the Old Testament tithe and applied it as a "recommended minimum" for Christians in their giving.

The New Testament talks about the importance and benefits of giving. We are to give as we are able.

Sometimes that means giving more than 10 percent; sometimes that may mean giving less. It all depends on the ability of the Christian and the needs of the church.

Every Christian should diligently pray and seek God's wisdom in the matter of participating in tithing and/or how much to give (James 1:5). Above all, all tithes and offerings should be given with pure motives and an attitude of worship to God and service to the body of Christ. "Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:7).


He showed the rich man around the housing suburbs, with fantastic mansions with huge pillars at the entrance.

HOMILY GIVEN IN COMMEMORATION OF THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED— ALL SOULS DAY

"So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom" (Ps.90: 12).



There is an adage that one is never too old to learn, and the above statement that comes from **Psalm 90**, which is attributed to Moses, is a reflection of that old saying. Indeed we should always pray to God to teach us to count our days, rightly, so as to take note of how few they are and to spend them fruitfully. We are always involved in the crazy circle of chasing time. The psalm has, therefore, been aptly described by one theologian as "A **Psalm of mortal limitations.**" Moses was well suited to write on the meaning of life and death

because after wandering in the wilderness with the Israelites for 40 years, he saw that in life we are but in death, especially, after witnessing the death of a whole generation. Therefore, it is only the Lord who is immortal can serve as our refuge and dwelling place. Shakespeare will say, "There is nothing serious in mortality."

What is life, one may ask? Is it merely one's existence? Longfellow in his verse, A Psalm of Life, tells us that "Life real, life is earnest..." The most notable thing about life is the strong link it has with time. Time defines how we lead our life, for better or for worse. And life is compared with money to some extent. You can spend it any way you choose, but you can only spend it once. And when you spend money there is effectively only one of two ways that it can be spent—either to waste it or invest it. Hope you re-call the Parable of the Talents! If you invest money you enjoy the dividend. But if you waste it, as a spendthrift, like the Prodigal Son, or the man who had one talent and chose to hide it in a hole, you may end up sharing with swine their food or facing the wrath of the master. Note that you have the freewill to use your money the way you wish. You are at liberty to choose either to invest the money or to waste it. The same is true with life. No matter your age, health or financial status, you can make the rest of your life the best.

What is the importance of time in life? Benjamin Franklin is reported to have advised, "Do not squander time, for it is the stuff life is made of". Some of us, habitually, fight time. We always wait till the eleventh hour. If you want to know how to utilize time then look to Jesus. Look at how Jesus was able to 'subdue' time. Jesus was never in a hurry. A certain theologian has remarked, "Although Jesus was doing the most important job in history (redeeming the world), and...only had a few years to do it", He made time to consider even the flowers and the birds of the air and had time for children to bless them. God expects us to use time responsibly. Despite existing in a realm that is not bound by time or space, He is the Creator of time and, thus, greater than time. Therefore the first step in 'subduing' time, argues the theologian, is to "totally immerse yourself in God", and this is what Ps. 90 teaches us. "So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom". This is after the Psalmist has praised God for being their refuge from one generation to another and He continues to be God "from everlasting to everlasting". The Psalmist continues to make us aware that a thousand years in the sight of God are but yesterday when it

is past, and as a watch in the night, thus the "three score years and ten" allotted to us is nothing in the face of God.

The theologian then goes further to interpret for us the four letters in the word TIME as an aid in understanding the importance of time, as God expects from us:

- *TREASURE:* God expects us to <u>treasure</u> time as a valuable commodity. Every day is precious, that's why God asks us "to number our days". Yesterday is history. Tomorrow remains unknown. Today is a gift, the reason for being called the "present"; it is presented to you free of charge.
- *INVEST*: Time can't be saved, it can only be invested. However, if time is not used it is lost forever. Where you invest your time reveals what is most important in your life. How much time do you invest in devotion to your God? The hymnist says to us, "Forever with the Lord! Amen, so let it be. Life from the dead is in that word, it is immortality." Yes, you should be with your God every time (forever) because where your heart is there is your treasure, says Jesus. The converse is also true, where your treasure is, there your heart will be. How much time do you devote to your family also?
- *MANAGE:* God is the Creator of time and He alone controls it. Every moment is a gift from God that, as His stewards, must be managed wisely. Time management is said to be a misleading concept because one cannot really manage time. You cannot delay it or fast-forward it, or save it. No matter what you do, time keeps moving forward. Isaac Watts, the hymnist, who wrote, "O God our help in ages past", which is based on the psalm under review, vividly describes the transient nature of time thus, "Time, like an ever-rolling stream, bears all its sons away; they fly forgotten, as a dream dies at the opening day". And Caswall, reminding us of the short-span of life we have in this our earth plane, also writes, "Days and moments quickly flying blend the living with the dead; soon our bodies will be lying each within its narrow bed." Friends, the challenge is not to manage time, but to manage ourselves.
- *ENJOY:* The time you spend with your family and fellow Christians should be enjoyable. It should be the best time in your life. Ps. 84 says to us, "I shall rather be a door-keeper in the House of the Lord than to dwell in the tents of the ungodly". You should have a quality time with your God. How many of us pray both in the morning and evening? Similarly, have enjoyable time with your family. Nobody on their deathbed ever said, "I wish I had spent more time at work", though there are others who would crave for more time with God. Remember what one of the thieves crucified with Jesus asked from Christ: "Lord, when thy kingdom comes, remember me." You should say "yes" to happy memories. You don't have very long time to live so we need to make some happy memory of time: Time to treasure; Time to invest; Time to manage, and Time to enjoy!

Usually, at a time like this our hearts become heavy. Losing a loved one has never been easy. Indeed, **we need to mourn our dear ones.** But Apostle Paul cautions us not to overdo it, like those who do not have faith. Christ, through His resurrection, has become the "first-fruit" of those who are slept. A certain esoteric society I used to be a member in those days

has this as the watchword when any of the members passes on: When asked what has happened to an individual who has passed on, the answer is, He or she has been called for higher services above. And so I challenge all of you here to have the same conviction for the Christian never dies. In the midst of life there is death for us.


Charles Wesley reminds us, as saints, of our togetherness with those who have responded to the higher services above in his hymn thus: "Let saints on earth in concert sing with those whose work is done; for all the servants of our King in earth and heaven are one. One family, we dwell in him, one Church, above, beneath; though now divided by the stream, the narrow stream of death." We are called upon to have our share in our Father's "many mansions". As Baring-Gould says in his hymn, "On the Resurrection morning souls and body meet again; no more sorrow, no more weeping, no more pain! On that happy Easter morning all the graves their dead restore; father, sister, child, and mother meet once more." My brother, my sister do you believe that you will once again meet your loved

one? I do!



Rest Eternal grant unto them, O Lord! And Let Light Perpetual, shine upon them. May they Rest in Peace, AMEN!

The Toy Stall run by Karin, was also very popular and it was sold out soon! Definitely something to concentrate on next year.



Men say they want a better deal and so on strike they go, But what a deal we've given God to whom all things we owe. We don't care who we hurt to gain the things we like;


But what a mess we'll be in, if God should go on strike.

One day he met a fox who was as desperate for friendship as he was. He asked the fox to play with him.
"I can't because no one has taken the trouble to tame me," the fox answered. "What does "to tame" mean?" asked the Little Prince "It means to establish ties," the fox replied. "And what does "to establish ties" mean?" the Little Prince persisted. "Just that," said the fox. "To me you are still nothing more than a little boy like a thousand other little boys. And to you I am nothing more than a fox like a thousand other foxes. But if you tame me, then to me you

will be unique in all the world. And to you I will be unique in all the world." "I'm beginning to understand." said the Little Prince.

"My life is very monotonous," the fox went on. "I hunt chickens; people hunt me. But if you tame me, it will be as if the sun came to shine on my life. "Don't walk in front of me; I may not follow. Don't walk behind me; I may not lead. Walk beside me and be my friend."


Thank you Lord for the gift of renewed friendships. May we cherish them, and indeed be the best of friends.




Fr Don wrote this letter for my School Reunion a few years ago and it made me think about the renewal of old friends and family at this time of the year.
